FROM THE PRINCIPAL

As expected we have had a busy start to term 3. There have been a few staff absences due to Covid but so far (touch wood, fingers crossed, breaths held etc.) we are in a better position than last term. With regards to student attendance we continue to have relatively high student absences. Certainly much of this can be accounted for with Covid and the general flu/cold that is prevalent in the community. However, we also have high numbers of students who are absent for other reasons and for reasons unknown to us. These infographics show why it is very important that children attend school; and has a few strategies to consider when reflecting on your child's attendance and how you can support the school and give your child a better chance of success with regular attendance. We will be working with you as a school community to ensure that we have children attending school as often as possible so that we know that they are not at risk of having too many learning gaps nor are they missing out on fantastic social events.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

PHONICS SCREENING CHECK TERM 3



Phonics is the relationship between letters and sounds. Readers use phonics skills, beginning with letter sound correspondences, to pronounce words and then attach meaning to them. Students learn the relationship between a phoneme (sound) and grapheme (the letter(s) that represent the sound in written language). It is vital in learning to read.

In term 3, primary schools complete the Phonics Screening Check (PSC) with their year one students.


The PSC is a simple assessment that tells year one teachers how their students are progressing in phonics. Analysing student errors allows teachers to see students' specific strengths and weaknesses in phonics and gives teachers a means for selecting their teaching strategies.

The 2022 phonics screening check is implemented during weeks 3 to 6 this term. Ms McGorman and Mrs Stokoe will be administering it with their year one students in week 4.


COFFEE CLUB

GERMAN NEWS



German and the Australian Curriculum....

The nature of German language learning

German and English are both derived from the Germanic branch of the Indo-European language family and share many similar lexical and grammatical features. Modern German also borrows from modern English, for example, *der Computer*, as does English from German, for example, 'kindergarten'.

German is a largely phonetic language with many of the same sounds as English, and the same Roman alphabet. In addition to the standard 26 letters, there is the use of the *Umlaut* (Ä/ä, Ö/ö and Ü/ü) and the *Eszett* (ß). A major difference from English is the capitalisation of all nouns.

German is well known for its morphological creativity in forming long words through compounding. The German language has two different forms of address, formal and informal, dependent on the relationship between the communicators.

The Australian Curriculum: Languages, Foundation to Year 10 – German is pitched to second language learners

What's happening in Term 3 German....

Junior Primary:

The Junior Primary classes have begun working on a unit of work focussing on the story, 'The little red hen' – 'Die kleine rote Henne'.

Throughout the term, students will:

- read and view the story in both English and German
- Make comparisons between the two stories
- Create a 'word wall' using both German and English words
- Complete sequencing tasks about the story
- Write simple sentences in German about the red hen', developing students' vocabulary and knowledge of colours, animals and short simple phrases from the story such as 'not I and I will!'




Middle and Upper Primary

Students have begun working on a unit entitled 'Superhelden – Superheroes'.


Throughout the term, students will:

- Create a superhero of their choice, including writing a profile about this character in German and English and drawing and designing this character.
- Using modelling clay to make a 3D model of their Superhero.
- Create a 'trading card', with details written in German about their Superhero.
- Students will develop their skills to write short passages in German about a specific topic, in this case, Superheroes and further develop their German vocabulary.

NAIDOC WEEK AT NPS

NAIDOC Week (**National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee**) occurs annually in July, and celebrates the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

During NAIDOC Week the upper primary classes learnt about traditional Aboriginal shelters, and names for these. One of the names of the Kaurna people was Wurlie, A wurlie was a circle of sticks in the ground, with grass woven. A Wiltja is a word used by the Pitjantjatjara people of the APY lands. A humpy is shelter made from bent sticks pushed into the ground with leaves or grass attached. We spoke about how shelters were made from the resources available in different areas of Australia. Some language groups used bark, grasses to construct shelters. In some language groups the mother and father slept at the entrance of the hut whilst their children slept at the back. Our two classes combined using the ideas of making a structure to seek shelter. We worked together as a team to build a shelter with the resources available at school, and some hessian.

The Aboriginal Community Engagement Officer, Brooke, created a fun cooking class for the ATSI students in recognition of NAIDOC week.

The traditional ingredients or 'bush foods' used were roasted wattle seeds and ground lemon myrtle. The students had a fantastic time and put together packs to share with all staff.



Cooking for Connection



Traditional Lemon or Wattle Seed Cookies

This activity was developed by the Aboriginal workers in the Foundation's OurSPACE Program in NSW.

Preparing, cooking, and sharing food is a foundational experience in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture. It creates opportunities for healing and connection when there is a safe adult to share the experience with.

Through food preparation, children come to experience their identity in relationship to the elders and family in community.

Cooking and preparing food is an activity that supports connection and promotes positive self-worth.

Children learn about their culture by cooking with ingredients found in nature which can be connected back to the histories of their families and communities.

Once the cookies are made, Aboriginal people involved with children can support them to extend their learning by decorating them with their totems, other symbols and art from nature.

What you will need

- 250g Sugar
- 250g Butter
- 500g sifted self-raising flour
- 4 eggs or 1/3 Emu egg
- 25g Ground lemon myrtle or Wattle Seeds

What to do

- Mix sugar and butter together with a beater
- Add the emu egg or eggs to the mixture one at a time
- Fold in flour and myrtle or wattle seeds until combined
- Roll into small balls and put on baking tray
- Flour a fork and use it to press the balls down a bit
- Bake in oven 180 -190c for 15 minutes

What you might say and do

- Who would they like to bake these cookies for?
- What would those people like about them?
- What would they say when they were given the cookies?
- How would the children feel when they gave the cookies to these special people?
- How important is food to feeling like you belong to a family or mob?



Students are encouraged to wear sports clothes/uniforms on **Friday August 12th**.


A gold coin donation from students will help raise funds for new sports equipment.





The canteen is open Wednesday to Friday for recess and lunch purchases.







MID-YEAR INTAKE - INFORMATION FOR PARENTS



We are introducing a mid-year intake into preschool from 2023 and for school (reception) from 2024.

STARTING SCHOOL

From 2024 children who turn 5 years old:

- **before 1 May** can start primary school (the first year is known as reception) at the beginning of the year
- **from 1 May to 31 October** start school through the mid-year intake at the start of term 3 of that year
- **after 31 October** start school at the beginning of the following year.

Students who start school at the beginning of the year will complete 4 terms of reception.

Students who start school through a mid-year intake (start of term 3) will complete 6 terms of reception.

CHILDREN WITH DISABILITY OR ADDITIONAL NEEDS

If you have a child with disability or additional needs, talk to the principal or preschool director about the starting time that best suits your child's needs.
