#### **Governing Council**

#### FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL





In the R/1 and year 2 classes, we have begun using the Kids Lips program.

The Kids Lips photo cards of children's mouths, show the correct placement of the tongue, teeth and lips when articulating specific sounds. The program is mostly teaching about the phonetics-how we produce sounds.

We teach the children to focus on what we are doing to produce a phoneme.

What are the lips, teeth and tongue doing?

Is the airflow continuous or does it stop?

Is it voiced or unvoiced?

Is the air going through the nose?

For example, the phoneme /m/ is made with the lips together, the airflow comes through the nose. This is called a nasal sound is voiced, which means the voicebox vibrates. Placing two fingers on your throat helps you feel the vibration for a voiced sound.

Ask your child about voiced and unvoiced sounds, particularly if your child is in year 1 or 2.

Teachers use the cards when targeting specific phonemes-sounds. The children practice saying the phoneme and focus on how we make that sound. The kids Lips cards are also used to make a Sound Wall display in the classroom, this then becomes a visual reference that can referred to throughout the day.


